Dear Friends and Fellow Vincentians.

The Society's mid-year meeting in May and national assembly in September are always great opportunities to learn and reflect – and our most recent mid-year meeting during the first few days of May was no exception.

Our national president, Sheila Gilbert, is always inspiring in her approach to the conditions that imprison so many people in persistent, grinding poverty. She remains firm in her resolve not just to reduce poverty in the United States but to eliminate it. She knows that results aren't achieved in bold, sweeping moves but will only happen one person, one family and one community at a time.

To accomplish that goal, we have to remove barriers and create real change – not just talk about something but really do something. We need to be a real player," Gilbert said.

She noted that the society is working at the national level with agencies more closely than ever before and discussing what we can do to really end poverty. She also expressed a desire in making poverty an issue in the 2016 elections so that it will be one of the top three or four priorities for the next president.

To end poverty and the human suffering that goes along with it, the society must grow stronger. While our actions speak for themselves, the society's voice must grow louder to influence real change here in Des Moines and across the country.

To do that, we must grow the society at every level, beginning with our conferences -- my conference, your conference, all conferences in the Des Moines diocese.

We need to get more people involved, especially younger people. We're taking steps to make that happen, but you can take action

to make a difference, too. As one of the midyear speakers noted, "If each one of us just brings one family member or friend to join the society, we would double our size."

Just think about the powerful message it would send if every conference were to bring at least one new person to our July 13 Quarterly Breakfast or September 28 Friends of the Poor Walk. Think, too, of the impact our home visits and other works could have if we were to bring more active members into our conferences.

It is in doing so that we could help our friends and family grow in spirituality, too.

I was unable to attend the most recent Midwest regional meeting that was held in St. Louis June 6-7. However our Executive Director, Eric Woolson, as well as VP Chuck Korte attended. Eric relayed that he was moved by the words of the Most Reverend Edward Rice, Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of St. Louis. He noted that much has been made by the media about stories of Pope Francis' compassion for the poor as though that focus is something new and novel in the Church.

"I resent it and you should, too," he said. "The Pope hasn't gotten us 'on focus.' We <u>are</u> on focus. The Church has been working with the poor for 2,000 years. What the Pope has done is focus media attention on what we've done for years: corporal works of mercy and spiritual works of mercy. There are a lot of social services agencies out there, The difference with St. Vincent de Paul is divine charity, putting into action the charity of Christ."

Let's work together in Christ's spirit of divine charity to ease the burdens of poverty.

### SVdP Success Story – Collaboration Catholic Charities' Spanish Language Basic Computer Skills Course

The Catholic Charities' Spanishlanguage basic computer skills course is a true collaboration success story of the Tom Varilek Education Center. Led by Mireya Ramirez, an outreach specialist with Catholic Charities, separate eight-week courses are offered on Tuesday evenings and Thursday mornings. Each course is two-and-a-half hours long.

Ramirez notes that the education center's location is familiar and convenient for students. "They feel happy that we can provide a place very close. Before, we were at DMACC Success Center at Southwest Ninth and Porter, and that was a little far," she explains.

While most students drive to class, several have relied on DART for their evening transportation and benefited from SVdP on Sixth's location along several main bus routes and proximity to the central transfer station. The Spanish-language course, which has been offered at the education center only since 2013, was attended by 58 students last year and 22 in 2014 year-to-date. Ramirez, who recruits class participants via advertising in the Hispanic community newspaper and has a waiting list for coming sessions, normally has students at all 14 work stations.

Ramirez says that the educational center has solved her challenge of finding a class location. And, she jokes about its technology. "I'm very short so I can't reach the Smart Board but I use the mouse and key-

board for it and students like the big screen and seeing how to use the computer."

On a serious note, she adds, "After they finish the whole eight weeks, they feel more comfortable to continue and sometimes they prefer to continue with English language classes because they know how to use the computer, so they go on to DMACC or other places to obtain their educational goals."

Catholic Charities, a United Way agency, is a 501c3, non-profit, social service organization that serves people of all faiths in central and southwest Iowa. Established in the Diocese of Des Moines in 1924, it is "the official head of all Catholic welfare agencies in the Diocese and the link of cooperation with all other welfare agencies."
